Most will allow you to download the application from their web site. You can apply for a vote by mail ballot online starting August 10<sup>th</sup>.
- ★ Early Voting: Registered voters may cast a ballot prior to Election Day without having to provide a reason for wanting to vote early. This ballot is cast by personal appearance at the office of the election authority or at an early voting center. Early voting runs from September 29<sup>th</sup> through November 7<sup>th</sup>. Identification is required.
- ★ Grace Period Registration & Voting: Grace period registration and voting is available to those who were unable to register (or early vote) prior to the close of registration. The grace period registration is from October 12<sup>th</sup> to November 7<sup>th</sup> at certain locations only.
- ★ Election Day: On November 8<sup>th</sup> polls are open from 6 am 7 pm.
